11. Amendment of the Archbishop of Sydney Election Ordinance 1982

- 11.1 The Standing Committee has recently passed an ordinance to amend the Archbishop of Sydney Election Ordinance 1982 (the "Principal Ordinance"). The ordinance has received assent.
- 11.2 Under the Principal Ordinance, in order for a nominee who is on the Select List to be placed on the Final List, it is necessary for a majority of the members in both houses to vote by secret ballot in favour of a motion that the name of the nominee be placed on the Final List (clause 16). Prior to the passing of the recent amendments, clause 17(5) of the Principal Ordinance provided that if no nominee on the Select List received a majority of votes in both houses, the Synod would be required to adjourn and the nomination process start again.
- 11.3 Under the recently passed amendments, if no nominee on the Select List receives a majority of votes in both houses, the Synod is first given the option of voting again to determine whether a majority of both houses might be achieved. If the Synod decides not to vote again it retains the capacity to adjourn the session and start the nomination process again.
- 11.4 A copy of the Principal Ordinance, consolidated to include the recent amendment, is enclosed with this circular.

12. More on Arrangements and Procedures

Dates, Times and Venue

12.3 Please revisit items 2.1 to 2.3 of the circular of 11 March. The business paper for 5 August repeats some dates and times etc.

Name Tags/Public Gallery

- 12.4 *Please wear your name tag* as it is our major means of ensuring that Synod members only are admitted to the Theatre after the Presidential address on 5 August.
- 12.5 If you lose your name tag or forget to bring it, see the Deputy Registrar, Mrs Catherine Rich, at the Theatre for a temporary replacement. You will need to produce some form of photo ID for the temporary replacement tag to be issued.
- 12.6 There is a public gallery only for the opening sitting of the Synod.

Returning Officers/Voting

- 12.7 John Chapman and Martin Thearle are in charge of vote counting.
- 12.8 The voting procedures for the various stages are printed on the business paper. Please also revisit items 3.1 to 3.42 inclusive of the circular of 11 March.

Use of social media

- 12.9 Under clause 12 of the Archbishop of Sydney Elections Ordinance 1982 the public (including the media) will be excluded from the Synod meeting place at the conclusion of the Presidential address on the first day and will continue to be excluded until the end of the session on a subsequent day. Such exclusion seeks to create an environment in which Synod members can engage in free and frank discussion for the purposes of electing the next Archbishop.
- 12.10 It is considered that free and frank discussion among Synod members could be significantly undermined if Synod members use social media to convey accounts of Synod proceedings to or discuss proceedings with members of the public, particularly the media, before the outcome is known. Accordingly, the Standing Committee has requested that a motion be moved during the formalities on the first day of the session to enable the Synod to put in place a protocol concerning the use of social media and related matters during the period the public is excluded from the session. The motion is set out at item 1.13 of the Business Paper for the first day.
- 12.11 The motion does not propose that Synod members refrain from discussing entirely with non-Synod members the proceedings of the session during the public's exclusion from the meeting place. Rather the focus is communications undertaken by way of social media given its pervasive nature.
- 12.12 Consistent with the arrangements outlined in the first circular sent to Synod members on 11 March 2013, the protocol would not exclude the Chief Executive Officer of Anglican Media, with the approval of the President, to arrange for press releases to be made at appropriate times.

13. More on the Endowment of the See

- 13.1 A summary of the financial accounts for the Endowment of the See for 2010, 2011 and 2012 are included as Attachment 1 to this circular.
- 13.2 A report concerning the financial forecasts for the Endowment of the See Expenditure Fund is included as Attachment 2 to this circular.

14. More on Terms and Conditions of Appointment

- 14.1 Under the Endowment of the See Expenditure Ordinance 2012, the Endowment of the See Committee has determined that the following remuneration package will be provided to for the next Archbishop
 - Stipend 200% of the clergy minimum stipend as recommended under the guidelines approved from time to time by the Standing Committee, packaged if requested by the Archbishop.
 - Superannuation 17% of stipend or as recommended from time to time by the Standing Committee.
 - Long Service Leave provided in accordance with the Long Service Leave Canon 1992.
 - Annual leave provided in accordance with the Annual Leave Ordinance 1983.

- Motor vehicle a fully serviced motor vehicle in accordance with the guidelines established for the provision of motor vehicles for senior episcopal staff.
- Accommodation suitable housing to be leased in consultation with the Archbishop.
- Travelling expenses necessary intrastate, interstate and overseas travel on official business, apart from those expenses paid by the Work Outside the Diocese Committee.
- Representation expenses reimbursed for reasonable entertainment and other representation expenses incurred in the performance of his duty.
- Office services provided in St Andrew's House, and including but not limited to secretarial assistance, telephone (landline and mobile), computer and tablet.

15. Meals and Car parking

Meals etc

- 15.1 Drinking water dispensers are located in the Wesley Theatre Foyer.
- 15.2 There are a number of small restaurants and cafes in the vicinity of the Wesley Centre where a quick cup of coffee or a meal can be obtained for a reasonable range of prices.

Parking rates and times

15.3 We have negotiated the following car parking rates at 2 car parks for Synod members –

St Andrew's House (Wilson Parking), Kent Street

Piccadilly Car Park (Secure Parking), Pitt Street, underneath Wesley Centre

All days of Election Synod

Full Day Rate (in after 2 pm and out before midnight) \$31.50 (Secure discount ticket required)

- 15.4 Parking cannot be guaranteed in either of these car parks but if they are full there are other car parks you might use (in Kent Street especially, see overflow parking below). Overnight parking costs extra.
- 15.5 Please note that the St Andrew's House car park closes at midnight each night during Synod.

Parking procedure

St Andrew's House

- 15.6 For the St Andrew's House car park, we have included with this mailing one parking "follow-on" ticket (and instructions) which will enable you to obtain the discounted price of \$25 if you park your vehicle before 5.00pm on the first day of the Election Synod.
- 15.7 If you wish to pre-pay your parking on the first day of the Election Synod you will need to see the onsite manager who will, on the presentation of the follow-on ticket and the payment of \$25, issue you with an exit ticket. If you are unable to pre-pay, then before leaving the car park at the end of the evening, you insert the parking ticket into one of the Automatic Pay Stations on Level 2 or 4 followed by the follow-on ticket, then pay the \$25.
- 15.8 No follow-on ticket is required if you park after 5.00pm on any day of the Election Synod, when a flat rate of \$8.00 will apply. This can be prepaid.
- 15.9 The more Synod members that pre-pay their parking, the less time members will spend queuing at the Automatic Pay Stations at the end of each night of Synod.

15.10 Please note that the enclosed follow-on ticket does not guarantee a space at the St Andrew's House car park. As for previous years, you are encouraged to car-pool to maximise the number of car park spaces available.

Overflow parking

15.11 The operator of the St Andrew's House car park, Wilson Parking, is offering overflow parking at Citipark, 431 Kent Street (north of St Andrew's House) on **Monday 5 August**. A Wilson Parking manager will be on site at the St Andrew's House car park on the first day of the Election Synod to provide a follow-on ticket for use at 431 Kent Street at the same \$25 rate.

Piccadilly

- 15.12 For the Piccadilly car park, you will be issued with a parking ticket at the entry of the car park. You can then obtain a "Secure discount ticket" from the Clerks' table at the Synod venue for use on the day at the Automatic Pay Station. Before leaving the car park at the end of the evening, you insert the parking ticket into the Automatic Pay Station, followed by the "Secure discount ticket" which will discount the parking fee down to \$31.50. You need a ticket for each day.
- 15.13 Please note that parking *cannot* be prepaid at the Piccadilly car park.

Endowment of the See Expenditure Fund Forecast

(A report from the Standing Committee.)

Purpose

1. The purpose of this report is to inform the Synod of the financial forecasts for the Endowment of the See ("EOS") Expenditure Fund for 2013 to 2017, together with actions taken by the EOS Committee to increase income and reduce expenditure.

Recommendation

2. It is recommended that Synod receives this report.

Background

- 3. For some years the EOS Committee has been aware of the need to ensure that funding for the purposes of the Archbishop's Office is made more sustainable.
- 4. Different solutions were explored and, in particular, advice given to the EOS Committee indicated that the Greenoaks development would provide a substantial injection of funds which would largely solve the difficulty. However, this proved not to be the case.
- 5. The Global Financial Crisis occurred in 2008.
- 6. The Archbishop's office was further affected by the cessation of distributions from St Andrew's House Corporation to the EOS Committee during 2010 to 2012.
- 7. As a consequence the EOS Committee was forced from 2009 to make some hard decisions to drastically reduce expenditure. A number of measures were undertaken, the most significant of which was to reduce staffing by one-third from 27 to 18. These measures had the effect of reducing expenditure from approximately \$5 million per year to \$3 million per year, but also meant that the Archbishop's office was not able to function as efficiently as before, with added pressure on the workload of bishops and others assisting the Archbishop.
- 8. In 2012 the Endowment of the See Capital Ordinance and the Endowment of the See Expenditure Ordinance were passed. Anglican Church Property Trust Diocese of Sydney ("ACPT") now has the responsibility of managing the capital of the EOS and the EOS Committee manages the expenditure.
- 9. The Property Trust has recently considered five year cash flow forecasts for the Capital Fund and the EOS Committee has considered five year cash flow forecasts for the Expenditure Fund.

Progress

- 10. The first draft of the five year cash flow forecasts for the EOS Expenditure Fund showed that by the end of 2017, the Fund would have a cash deficit of \$754,027, resulting from expenditure exceeding income in each of the years from 2013 to 2017.
- 11. As a consequence, the Archbishop and the EOS Committee recognised the need to -
 - (a) Reduce expenditure by at least \$200,000 per annum,
 - (b) Seek to increase income, either by increasing the income from existing sources, or developing new sources of income.
- 12. It was also recognised that as well as eliminating the forecast cash deficit, it was desirable to build up sufficient cash reserves. The EOS Committee was advised that a cash reserve equal to the expenditure for 3-4 months was prudent. This is an amount of about \$1 million.

Reducing expenditure

- 13. It was recognised that 5 regions could not financially be sustained into the future, and that the EOS Committee would only be able to pay for 4 regions.
- 14. The Archdeacon of Liverpool in the Georges River Region concludes his appointment at the end of June 2013. The Archbishop has put other arrangements into place to provide Episcopal ministry without significant charge to the EOS Committee until the end of 2013.
- 15. The reduction to 4 regions, together with several other small expenditure savings amounted to a total of \$1,183,704 over the period to the end of 2017. This resulted in a revised forecast of a cash surplus at the end of 2017 of \$429,677.

16. Nevertheless, the forecasts showed that in most years expenditure would still exceed income, necessitating further savings to be made. The Archbishop and the EOS Committee have considered whether further reductions could be made (notably in staffing) and concluded that the running of the Archbishop's office and episcopal ministry would be adversely affected by any such move.

Enhancing income

- 17. Consideration was given as to whether additional income could be generated from existing income sources.
- 18. At a joint meeting of representatives of the EOS Committee, ACPT and St Andrew's House Corporation on 31 May 2013, the members of St Andrew's House Corporation were asked to explore the possibility of making a small increase in distributions from the St Andrew's House Trust. This in turn would increase the distributions able to be made by ACPT from the EOS Capital Fund to the EOS Expenditure Fund.
- 19. After its meeting of 5 June 2013, the Corporation advised the EOS Committee that a small increase in distributions from 2013 could be made, with the likelihood of further increased distributions in 2014 to 2017.
- 20. With the incorporation of the increase in distributions, the revised forecasts indicate that the cash surplus at the end of 2017 would amount to \$1,195,080, with income of the Expenditure Fund exceeding expenditure from 2015 onwards. A summary of those forecasts and the main assumptions made in preparing those assumption, is attached.
- 21. A key assumption in the forecasts is that Bishopscourt will be sold towards the end of 2014, with the proceeds of sale forming part of the Capital Fund and being invested in their entirety in the Long Term Pooling Fund. This will result in an increase in the distributions from the Capital Fund to the Expenditure Fund which will enable the payment of rent for the residence for the Archbishop and contribute towards the other expenses of the EOS.
- 22. In addition, five year financial forecasts for the Expenditure Fund have been prepared with alternative assumptions for the timing of the sale of Bishopscourt. These assumptions show that if the sale of Bishopscourt is delayed beyond the end of 2014, standby funding is likely to be required for the EOS Expenditure Fund during 2015.
- 23. In terms of seeking other sources of income, the EOS Committee believes that alternative funding of the Archives should be considered. The EOS has paid the total cost of the Archives for many years, apart from the last couple of years in which there has been a contribution of \$50k from PCR. There is a good argument that the responsibility for Archives is a synodical or parish one, rather than simply the EOS. Accordingly, an increase in PCR funding for Archives is sought by the EOS Committee. This is not factored into the attached cash flow projections.

Summary

- 24. The current five year projection which incorporates increased funding from St Andrew's House Corporation and reduced expenditure by having 4 regions rather than 5, indicates that the provision of funding for the Archbishop's office from the Endowment of the See should be possible over the next 5 years and into the future.
- 25. Those projections anticipate the necessity of selling Bishopscourt.
- 26. It will still be necessary for the EOS Committee to watch income and expenditure carefully, particularly so that a cash surplus can be built up to provide a buffer for several months' expenditure should the need arise.
